

# 1-year course for practising clinicians September 2023-July 2024

### **Clinical Practice from a Jungian Perspective**

This international online course has been developed to be accessible for practising clinicians from around the world. The course provides a unique opportunity for professional development and is delivered by leaders in the field of Jungian psychoanalysis.

The course has been devised to be accessible to those for whom English is not their first language while being sufficiently engaging, stimulating and rich for those whose first language is English.

We have brought together some of the SAP's most experienced practitioners and thinkers to deliver the course. The course takes place over 10 Saturdays and includes 30 hours of presentations and supervision masterclasses.

### **Course Format:**

10.00 - 13.30 (UK time) with a 30-minute break.

During the masterclass the presenter will work in front of the group with a participant on the case they present. Up to two cases can be supervised during each masterclass, followed by a discussion. The participants will be asked to select clinical material that resonates with the theme of each session and to submit their requests ahead of the session.

#### **The Course Leaders**

**Jay Barlow** is the Director of Training at the SAP and a Training and Supervising Analyst. He has an MA in Jungian and Post- Jungian Studies and has worked as a psychoanalytic psychotherapist in the NHS. He has a private practice in Clapham and supervises developing analytic groups in Eastern Europe.

**Warren Colman** is a Training and Supervising Analyst of the Society of Analytical Psychology. He is a member of the Editorial Board and former UK Editor-in-Chief of the Journal of Analytical Psychology. He teaches, lectures and supervises internationally, especially in Eastern Europe and has published extensively on a range of topics including sexuality, the self, the therapeutic process and symbolic imagination.

**Dr David Hewison** is a Training Analyst of the Society of Analytical Psychology and a Consultant Couple Psychoanalytic Psychotherapist at Tavistock Relationships, where he has been a trainer, supervisor, and Head of Research and Ethics for many years. He has a long-standing interest in difference and cross-cultural relationships, as well as in links across analytic theories and research, and in the understanding of imagination and creativity. He publishes and lectures internationally.

**Dr Lara Lagutina** is the Programme Director for the Analytic Training at the SAP, a Training Analyst and a Clinical Psychologist, with a specialist training in working with trauma and a particular interest in early relational trauma. She is on the editorial board of the Journal of Analytical Psychology and works in full time private practice in London.

**Malcolm Rushton** is a training analyst of the SAP and works full time as an analyst in private practice. He has an interest in antiquities from various cultures as well as symbolism and shamanism in ancient art, this is expressed in his wide-ranging collection. His current exploration is of the presentation of extreme psychological states in television drama.

**Professor Joy Schaverien** Dr Joy Schaverien is a Training Analyst of the Society of Analytical Psychology and an art psychotherapist. Formerly a member of the editorial board of the Journal of Analytical Psychology, she lectures internationally and has published extensively on art and psychoanalysis, Boarding School Syndrome and topics related to the erotic transference. Her books on this theme include Desire and the Female Therapist (1994), Gender Countertransference and the Erotic Transference (edited 2007), and most recently a new edition of The Dying Patient in Psychotherapy: Erotic Transference and Boarding School Syndrome (2020) all published by Routledge

**Martin Schmidt**, MBPsS, is a Jungian Training Analyst of the Society of Analytical Psychology. He has a private practice in London. He has worked as a psychologist and psychotherapist in psychiatric rehabilitation for over 20 years with patients suffering from psychosis and personality disorders. From 2016-2019 he was the Honorary Secretary of the International Association for Analytical Psychology (IAAP) and its Regional Organizer for Central Europe. He teaches and supervises widely both in the UK and abroad. His paper *'Psychic Skin: psychotic defences, borderline process and delusions'* (JAP, Feb 2012, Vol 57, no 1) won the Fordham prize for best clinical paper in 2012 and was nominated for the Gradiva award by the National Association for the Advancement of Psychoanalysis in New York in 2013.





**Jan Wiener** has been Director of Training at the SAP and is a Training and Supervising Analyst. She teaches and supervises regularly within the UK and in different countries including Russia, Romania, Bulgaria, Serbia and the Czech Republic. She is the author of a number of papers and chapters on subjects such as training, ethics and supervision and also four books. The most recent, edited with Catherine Crowther, is called 'From Tradition to Innovation: Jungian Analysts working in Different Cultural Settings' (2015).

**Susanna Wright** is a former co-Editor in Chief of the Journal of Analytical Psychology. She works mainly in private practice in North London and Kendal, Cumbria. She is a Supervising and Training Analyst for the SAP and BJAA. She has an MA in the psychodynamics of organisations, has worked in organisational consultancy and as a supervisor and analyst of routers for IAAP in St Petersburg. She teaches and supervises internationally and is on the Executive Committee of the IAAP.

**Vernon Yorke** is a Training and Supervising analyst of the SAP. He teaches and supervises for the SAP and for WPF Therapy and works in private practice. He has written a chapter called 'Bion's 'Vertex' as a Supervisory Ob- ject' in Supervision and the Analytic Attitude (Whurr 2005).
